

A BURGLAR SHOT. Albert D. Siple Did the Shooting-Siple Was Exonerated by Jury.

Another tragedy in which the life of a man went out via the bullet route is added to Jefferson county's list. The affair occurred at the farm of J. K. Sipie, near Lane's big dam, above Lane's Mills, early Wednesday morning and the victim was a Swede named Eric Nillson, who has been wandering about in this section for some time, and ap-parently of unsound mind. His slayer is Al. D. Siple, who has been working on the farm in the absence of his brothor, the owner, who is employed as ear inspector for the B., R. & P. R. Ra at Punxeutawney. Albert and his brother's wife and two children live at the farm and they witnessed the deed. The story of the affair as taken from the evidence given is as follows:

Wednesday morning about three o'clock, Mrs. Siple, who occupies a sleeping apartment on the ground floor,

steeping apartment on the ground book, was awakened by some one moving about the house. She was not alarmed as she supposed it was her brother-in-law. The continued noise, however, made her suspicious and she called Albert, whose bedroom is up stairs. Receiving no response she called several times and no response she called several times and he finally awakened and came down states and asked what she wanted. She replied that someone was prowing around through the house. Lighting a lamp and with a revolver in one hand and the lamp in the other he went into the front room. The outside door opened as he entered and a man swung around the casing into the room. Siple was about six feet from the man, and aiming his weapon at the intruder's shoulder fired, the builet taking effect but did not knock the man down. Siple asked him several times what he was asked him several times what he was doing there, but instead of giving any reply the man pushed the door shut behind bim and made a move towards. Siple, who fired again and the man fell dead in his tracks with a bullet through the heart. Mrs. Siple had jumped out of bed when the first shot was fired and entered the front room as the second. entered the front room as the second bullet was sent to its mark. As the man fell she exclaimed, "O. Albert, have you killed him?" and Albert re-plied, "I'm afraid I have."—Brockway-

D. Siple, who shot the burglar, is A. D. Siple, who shot the burgiar, is well known here, his parents reside in West Reynoldsville. He is a christian young man, a member of the Baptist church, and feels very bally over the tragedy. A coroner's jury was empancied and after hearing all the testimony the jury returned a verdict of justifiable homicide and Siple was exonerated.
