

Information for School Boards

Smooth lighting rod salesmen are working school boards and selling charts, such as the so-called New Education, and prices obtained for such charts varies from \$7.50 to \$60.00 per set. The school board that pays \$60.00 gets the same toing as the one that pays \$7.00. Prices are governed by the "greenness" of the school board. Side payments or "grafts" for getting signatures run high in most cases. The cost of charts to salesmen averages from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per set. Thousands have been sold at retail for less than \$10.00 per set. In 10,000 set lots such charts are made for \$2 per set.

Soft Coal Market.

Soft coal is actively going forward to all the lake ports of shipment, and the movement this year is expected to be much in excess of last season. Local

wholesale dealers in bituminous coal declare the present supply in Buffalo is fully adequate. At the eastward it is said that in the way of contracts business is not so brisk as the outlook for strength would seem to indicate as

reasonable. At Buffalo the soft coal is quiet, and though there is no particular effort to crowd the market, all of the shippers and dealers are doing a good business. Prices are firm and steady, and consumers are willing to pay what is asked, as no effort is made to cut quotations. Complaint is made by the producers of a scarcity of miners and very few of the

mines are operated to their full capacity. This has caused a slight searcity of coal for the Buffalo market, but not enough to make any appreciable difference except to strengthen the prices.

How true it is that it is the immensity of things that shocks or interests. The great hue and cry over the recent minine accident in Utah attracts attention because so many were lost at one swoop as it were. To get the coal in Pennsylvania last year, cost 719 lives, and there were 1.517 injured; these came as a few at a time so that no great stir was made, but it is an appalling list, nevertheless.

The growth of the soft coal trade is of such magnitude that really none of the hard coal agents are such big fellows to-day as they were only a few years ago. The total output of hard coal is but twenty per cent of the annual production of coal in this country.
