## Action of Borough "Dads" Concerning Electric Light Company's Contract.

A special meeting of the town council was held Wednesday, May 22, 1900, for the purpose of taking such action on the contract with E. A. Farrin, his successors or assigns, or the Reynoldsville Electric Co., to furnish lights to the borough as shall be decided upon, said action shall be taken upon the failure to have said lights turned on within six months from date of said contract and ordinance, the lights not being hung over center of streets and not hav ing been placed under the direction of street committee

On motion the following resolution was passed.

Was passed. WHEREAS, The council of the bor-ough of Reynoldsville, on October 5th, 1899, passed ordinance No. 61, and exe-cuted a contract, in pursuance of said ordinance, granting a franchise to E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, to orect and maintain poles, wires, &c. on the public streets, alleys lanes and pub-lie squares of said borough, for the purpose of supplying electricity for motor power, or for heat and light to such person or persons as may desire the same; said poles to be erected at such places and on such lines as the street committee should direct, and of the height of not less than twenty-five feet above the street, straight, and of suffi-cient strength to carry all wires placed thereon, and

WHEREAS, Said council passed, on Nov. 6, 1899, a resolution, and in pursu-ance thereof, entered into the above referred-to contract, authorizing and agreeing with said E. A. Ferrin, his successors, heirs and assigns, to furnish said borough with thirty 2009-candle-power are lights, to be placed on center of the several streets in said borough at places designated in said resolution, at a fixed price for a fixed time, and said lights to be turned on within six months from Oct. 5th, 1899; and

WHEREAS, More than six months have clapsed since the passing of said ordinance, resolution and the signing of said contract, and said thirty are lights are not yet turned on, nor the said poles located under the direction of the street committee, twenty-five feet high, have said lights been located or h hung on centre of the streets designated in said resolution as the place of hanging said are lights, nor as provided in said contract, resolution and ordinance. Now therefore be it.

By the council of said bor-ough, and it is hereby resolved by au-thority of the same, that the said contract be and the same is hereby abro-gated, and that the said borough of Reynoldsville denies that it is and refuses to be bounden by said ordinance. resolution and contract, by reason of the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or as signs failing to comply with and fulfil their obligations under said ordinance, resolution and contract, thereby and under the terms and conditions of said ordinance, resolution and contract, ren dering the same null and void. And it is further Resolved. That the said borough of

Reynoldsville will not undertake to fuifil any part of said ordinance, resolution or contract, for the above stated reasons and the secretary of said council is hereby authorized and instructed to forthwith give notice to said E. A. Fer-rin, his successors or assigns, of this action of the council, by personally or in some other safe and secure way, de-livering a true copy of this resolution.
