The ladies finally gave up the project and the matter was taken up by J. Van Reed and A. E. Dunn, who solicited the money for fountain. After the work was started Wm. M. Foster became interested and these three gentlemen not only paid \$10.00 apiece in cash, but they also put in a number of days gratuitous work on fountain. John M. Hays, Esq., raised \$50.00 by subscription recently to pay off an indebtedness on fountain. The Village Improvement Society and W. C. T. U. paid liberally to the fountain fund. The fountain has proven to be a great convenience, not only to strangers, but also to our own citizens. PROPOSED JEFFERSON COUNTY HOME.

The illustration here given is a correct representation of the front elevation of the proposed Jefferson County Home. The contract for erection of Home was let by County Commissioners Murray, Webster and Hawk last week to Hyde, Murphy & Co., of Ridgway. Contract price was \$68,745. There were four bids, as follows: J. H. Long, Punxsutawney, \$88,153.92; Charles Hastings, Brookville, \$74,431; Charles Marks, Erie, \$70,895; Hyde, Murphy & Co., Ridgway, \$68,745. The contractors will begin work this week and are to have the building completed about the middle of May, 1901. The building is to be 124x214 feet, two stories high, built of brick, with iron stairs. There is to be a hospital and insane department in building—12 rooms for insane patients. There will be fifty rooms on first floor, not including laundry, bakery and closets. There will be thirty-five rooms on second floor and chapel 35x38 feet.
