PASSPORTS NEEDED IN GERMANY.
According to a recent report to the State department from our charge d'affaires at Berlin, since the assassination of King Humbert, travelers in Germany are subjected to a more strict police supervision than has heretofore been exercised and a passport is more than ever necessary in order to avoid trouble.

In Berlin, as in many other German cities, the police regulations in regard to the establishment of identity are strict. All hotel, lodging and boarding house keepers are required to inform the police within twenty-four hours of the persons who stay at their houses and as to whether or not they are provided with passports or similar papers. The Berlin President of Police has recently ordered that these regulations be more strictly enforced, and, as a result, several American citizens have been subjected to considerable annoyance because they were not able to establish satisfactorily their citizenship at once.

Soft Coal Market.
Coal Trade Journal.
Soft coal continues to be actively forwarded from all the mining districts to the several points of shipment and distribution, this movement is fully noted in the special reports printed in this edition, the interest in foreign shipments grows, and the cheap fuel of America is attracting the attention of the consumer in Europe. There is a good deal of needless exaggeration in the reports of business done, and the seeking of notice by alleged contractors is of daily occurrence. In the event of a larger trade abroad in soft coal or any lengthened idleness of the anthracite producer the price of soft coal would advance to the home consumer.

At Buffalo little coal is being shipped to the upper lakes and the most of the trestles are doing little or nothing. Freight rates continue unchanged, there being no effort to change on account of the small amount of coal moving. Locally the trade is very dull and few of the dealers report any special inquiry for fuel.

Soft coal is quiet as ever and there is little indication of improvement in the situation. Plenty of coal is coming in and dealers are finding it difficult to get rid of it as fast as it is offered to them. Prices remain steady but weak and it would not be a surprise to see a drop soon.
