High School Bulletin.

As time in its flight rolls down the dark channels of the past, and as each succeeding year brings that particular season when the American people are advised by their Chief Executive to raise their anthems of gratitude to the Giver of all Good for the blessings of the past year and the mercy that has shielded them from evil, it perhaps would not be amiss to dwell at this time on the circumstances connected with the founding of this day, and the facts which actuated its appointment.

Thanksgiving Day was first observed in 1607 at Mohegan, near the Kennebec river, Maine. At this place a small band of settlers had landed and as a mark of gratefulness for their safe arrival, the day was spent in prayer and thanksgiving. The second thanksgiving was held at Plymouth in 1621. There being a bounteous crop that year, Governor Bradford designated a day for the people to assemble and show their gratitude.

But in 1623 the conditions were the reverse of those in 1621. There was a long drought and the settlers were on the verge of starvation. Governor Bradford established a day for the people to spend in prayer and fasting. As the colonists assembled a storm seemed imminent and while they were at prayer rain fell in torrents and the meeting turned into one of thanksgiving.

From that time until the Revolution Thanksgiving was observed nearly every year. In 1796 President Washington set apart Feb. 19th as a day for the people to meet and render thanks to God for the great blessing He bestowed on the country.

In 1853 Pres. Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday in November a day of national Thanksgiving, and this day established has been invariably followed each year.

The DuBois high school submitted a reply to the challenge issued by the Reynoldsville high school to meet in a joint contest in which they stated the challenge will be accepted providing certain conditions are complied with. As we generously grant all the points but one, it seems as though the contest is an assured fact.

Although the programs rendered in past years by the Shakespearean Society have rendered its name immortal on the slab of fame, yet the program prepared for next Friday promises to eclipse any yet rendered by the society. The Bachelors are determined that their convention shall be one long remembered, and if work in its preparation and eloquence count for aught, there is no reason to believe that they will not accomplish their desired object.

A special meeting of the Literary Society was held Wednesday to consider the communication from the DuBois high school. Prof. Leavenworth, Clement Flynn and Christine Brown were named as a committee to confer with the representatives of DuBois.

The Spinsters have arranged an indignation meeting to be held on Friday, Dec. 14th.

The Thanksgiving vacation was utilized by the male members of the high school in seeking game, but so far we have not heard of anyone killing more than the law allows.
