Ordinance No. 70.

AN ORDINANCE Relating to the Erection of Wooden Buildings or Repairing same Section 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the borough of Reynoldsville, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same: That hereafter it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, corporation or corporations, to build, erect or construct, or cause to be built, erect or constructed, any wooden dwelling house, shop, warehouse, store or carriage house, stable or other tenement or wooden structure of any kind upon any lot or lots, part or parts of any lot or lots, in said borough on the following described territory, viz: Reginning at the southwest corner of Main and Third streets, thence along said Third street, south to Gordon alley; thence along said Gordon alley if an easterly direction to Cele alley; thence along said Willow alley; thence along said Third street to the place of beginning. Phorying, that dwelling houses and stables may be constructed of wood if same are incased with brick or stone. Section 2. That hereafter all roofs put on either old or new buildings as contemplated in section one of this ordinance, shall be of slate, tin, Iron or some other well-known noncombustible material.

Section 3. That hereafter it shall not be lawful to build, erect or construct any wooden addition or additions to any wooden dwelling house, shop, ware house, store or carriage house, stable, shed or other tenement, as mentioned, described and limited in section one of this ordinance.

Section 4. That if any person or persons, corporation or corporations, for the use of the said borough.

Section 5. That the corporate authorities are hereby directed to cause any such build.

One Hundred Dollars, for the use of the sald borough.

Section 5. That the corporate authorities are hereby directed to cause any such building or buildings, addition or additions, shed or sheds, or other building as described and mentioned in section one of this ordinance as may bereafter be erected, built or constructed in violation of this ordinance or any part thereof, to be removed at the expense of the owner or owners thereof, and the cost of such removal shall be collected by due process of law, together with a penalty of Fifty dollars per day for each day said structure is permitted to stand.

Section 6. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.
