Soft Coal Market.
Coal Trade Journal.
The soft coal market of the seaboard is not in so favorable a condition as we would like to see, and the decreased demand for bituminous coal at the eastward is a somewhat ominous token. It has so often happened that a falling off of demand on the part of eastern manufacturers has been the forerunner of business depression in certain lines that it may well be questioned whether the time is not ripe for a curtailment of bituminous production. The output of soft coal is now so largely under the control of one financial interest that we do not look for any serious overstocking of the market, but evidently the time is an opportune occasion to bring production to a lower level. In the central and western trade the bituminous situation is somewhat better owing to the demand for railway fuel and for other purposes aside from manufacturing. The western trade is of course greatly interested in the forthcoming convention but the result of that can scarcely be discussed in advance.

At Buffalo soft coal is coming in better supply, and a corresponding extension of trade is the result. Haulers of bituminous are rubbing their hands in satisfaction and tell you frankly their trade was never better at this season of the year. In fact the usual let up after the holidays has not yet put in an appearance and the present conditions of lively demand promise to continue for some time to come. As with anthracite, prices are well maintained and orders are fully equal to the amount of stock received, if they do not go beyond that.

There is much eastern money seeking investment in western Pennsylvania coal lands at present. In counties adjoining Allegheny particularly there is great demand for land for mining, and deals which involve over \$1,000,000 have been closed, and negotiations are on for more acreage.

A Miraculous Escape.
Last Sunday afternoon Mary London, daughter of Jef London, was struck by the "Flyer" near her home, about two miles above Big Run. She attempted to cross the track ahead of the train, when she was caught by a projection on the side of the engine and hurled about twenty feet.
