Brewer, \$182.54; by amount received from County Treasurer for license, \$114.00; by amount orders paid since Feb. 5th, \$69.30; leaves a balance in hand, \$778.47. Bills to the amount of \$83.50 were ordered paid.

Letter to Levi Schuckers,

Reynoldsville, Pa.

Dear Sir: Is a gallon of paint a gallon of paint, or half-a-gallon? Sometimes one, sometimes the other. E. P. Lynch, and his predecessor, Dehli, N. Y., sold a well known mixed paint for twenty years—it's a good paint, as mixed paints go.

N. Avery owns two houses exactly alike there. He painted one four years ago with this mixed paint—took twelve gallons. Last spring he painted the other house with DeVoe's; bought twelve gallons and had six gallons left. Same painter: George Gilbert. Same result, so far as looks go.
