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THE NEW DISTRICT.

Jefferson, Indiana, Clarion and Armstrong Counties Compose 27th Congressional District.

Last Wednesday evening the legislature passed a new congressional apportionment bill, which puts Jefferson county in the 27th district, composed of Jefferson, Indiana, Clarion and Armstrong counties. We were in the 21st district, composed of Jefferson, Indiana, Armstrong and Westmoreland counties. The only change in our district is Westmoreland for Clarion county. The population of the new district is 188,503, and Jefferson is the largest county in the district, 59,113, almost one-third of population of the entire district.

This ought to give Jefferson county the Republican candidate for Congress next year, and that candidate should be Hon. W. O. Smith. All things considered, the Republicans of Jefferson county should give Smith the nomination without opposition. Why not? He has the ability, has had experience and has made two contests for the congressional nomination, being endorsed both times by the voters of Jefferson county by large majorities, and for this reason ought to be given the nomination next year without opposition, and likely will.

Smith's record in the legislature proves him to be an able, honest and zealous legislator, worthy and capable in every respect to represent the 27th district in the halls of Congress. His record is so clean that the only charge his political enemies can bring against him is that he has been a candidate often enough and that he should retire and give somebody else a chance. That is not a serious charge, in fact, it should strengthen his candidacy with thoughtful people.

When a type setter in the government printing office at Washington Smith's ambition then, and has been ever since, was to be a Congressman some time, and he began to prepare himself to be able to fill the office creditably if ever elected to Congress. With this in view Smith placed himself before the people for Assemblyman as a stepping stone to Congress, and in the legislature he did not betray the confidence of his constituents, he looked after the interest of the people, and not his own. His integrity has never been questioned. Therefore, it would be folly to turn a worthy, capable and experienced man down simply because he had represented the people faithfully in the legislature several times and had been nominated twice for Congress, but failed to get the district nomination. For this very reason Smith would be the strongest man in the conference that the Republicans of Jefferson county could nominate.

While Smith is a citizen of Punxsutawney, yet we do not forget that he was born and reared in Reynoldsville and is in close touch with all our interests.

Rural Mail Boxes.

Under the Star Route mail carrier's new contracts which went into effect July 1st, free rural mail delivery becomes operative along the mail route. The new ruling provides that any person erecting a mail box along a star route line can have his mail placed therein daily upon giving his postmaster a written order to that effect.

Any mail can thus be delivered except registered letters. The department does not describe any particular design of box to be used for this service, but the person providing the box should see that it is of such character as to afford ample protection to his mail. The box should be so located on the road side that the carrier can deposit mail therein through an opening in the box, without leaving his vehicle.

The last legislature passed a bill prohibiting the sale and furnishing of tobacco to persons under sixteen years old. The penalty is a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or imprisonment not exceeding 30 days, or both.

Disorderly Conduct.

A good many persons seem to be unaware when they are guilty of disorderly conduct. They do all sorts of things in public, in the streets, at public gatherings and in street cars and elsewhere and appear to think they have a perfect right to annoy every one near them by word and deed. A recent legislature enactment may be referred to here for the benefit of such persons. Any one who makes, or causes to be made, any loud, hoisterous and unseemingly noise, or who, by using profane or obscene language, disturbs or annoys any one who is a passenger on any railroad or railway car, or who may be a visitor at any picnic grounds kept for public amusement, whereby the public peace is disturbed or broken, shall be deemed guilty of the offense of disorderly conduct, and, if convicted of the same before any magistrate shall be sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and a fine of ten dollars, and in default of such payment, shall be sent to county jail for not more than thirty days. The law is a broad one, and instances occur almost daily within the notice of most readers which fall within its provisions. What is lacking is more general enforcement of it.—Milton Standard.

Doleful Predictions.

Cole's Storms and Signs for July contains the following predictions: The greatest danger from storms during the current month will be between the 2nd and 7th; 8th and 12th; 13th and 18th; and from the 21st to the 30th severe storms may be looked for. Cannot Drink and Teach.

A recent act of the legislature forbids the using of alcoholic drinks by school teachers. The substance of the law referred to is as follows:
 That after the first Monday of June, one thousand, nine hundred and two, no teacher in this commonwealth shall receive from a county, city or borough superintendent, a certificate as a teacher who has not a fair knowledge of orthography, English grammar, mental and written arithmetic, history of the United States, the theory of teaching, and civil government, including state and local, and elementary algebra, nor shall such certificate be given to any person who is in the habit of using, as a beverage, any intoxicating drinks, or habitually takes opium; and all certificates given to teachers shall set forth the branches in which those holding them have been found proficient and indicate by suitable marks the degrees of that proficiency.
