He was an eloquent and impassioned orator but aside from reciting he wrote many poems and was a poet of rare ability. Although he has left us his works will remind us of him. The following selection, entitled Lincoln, is one of his writings:—

 Wrote the thoughts that were his sacred truth,
 Mid chaos of confusion he was firm,

 And like sweet bells within his nature rang,
 Men marked his tranquil mein and heard him just.
 And yet the lifted curtain might have shown

 That cared for the final martyr's stake,
 Who suffered countless times the martyr's pang!"
