TRIBUTE TO ST. PATRICK.

How Ireland's Great Patron Saint Was Memorized in Reynoldsville.

Editor of THE STAR:—The life and deeds of St. Patrick are still kept "green" in the minds and hearts of Irishmen and their offspring. On Monday, the birthday of the saint, the "wearing of the green" was visible in every direction, the attractive color ornamenting the clothing of the women as well as that of the men.

St. Patrick found Ireland a nation of pagans and converted them to Christianity. Many miracles are attributed to him, although they are doubted by some. To the firm believer in Christ there is nothing strange in the performance of miracles. He gave to the Apostles this power in order to affirm evidence of the true religion. Hear what the Saviour says after performing some miracles: "Greater things even than these can ye do if ye have the faith."

St. Patrick certainly had the faith, and therefore there could be nothing mysterious in Christ fulfilling His own promises. God often makes instruments of men to accomplish desired ends, and He will continue to do so until this earth ceases to be.

The A. O. H. of town in order to commemorate the memory of St. Patrick partook of holy communion in a body on Sunday and wore the emblems of their society. At second mass a grand eulogy on Ireland's saint was delivered by Father P. J. Donahue. He reviewed the deeds of Patrick in an explicit manner, while his phraseology in portraying Ireland and her noble sons was most eloquent and charming. The recital was delivered in good style and in many respects was edifying and impressive. Those who had the pleasure of hearing Father Donahue paying tribute to the saint were warm in their praise of it during the day, and were proud to note that this event did not pass by default.
