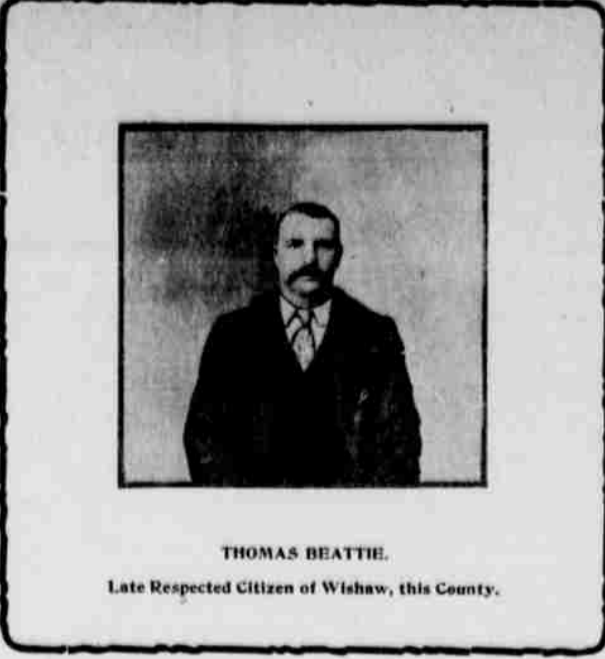

Late Respected Citizen of Wishaw, this County.

DEATH OF THOS. BEATTIE.

Was Born in Scotland—Died at Wishaw—Heart Trouble Caused Death.
Thomas Beattie, a good natured and kind hearted Scotchman who had resided in the neighborhood of Eleanora and Wishaw, near this place, thirteen years, died at his home at Wishaw at 9.00 p. m. Thursday, May 15, 1902, from heart trouble. He had been confined to bed three weeks before he died. He was unconscious from 6.00 a. m. Wednesday preceding his death until his spirit departed this life. Mr. Beattie was born in Scotland February 22, 1848, and was over 44 years old at time of death. He came to America when 14 years old. In 1878 he was married to Ellen Bakewell, who, with eleven children, survives him. He moved to Eleanora thirteen years ago and followed coal mining for a livelihood until a couple of years ago when on account of poor health he was compelled to abandon mining work and he embarked in the grocery business at Wishaw.

Mr. Beattie was a jovial fellow, always had a pleasant and kind word for everybody and consequently his friends were numerous. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge of Eleanora. Funeral service was held in the Cumberland Presbyterian church at Eleanora at 2.00 p. m. Saturday, conducted by Rev. H. T. Tompkins, Ph. D. The funeral was a very large one. Interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Mr. Beattie was a loving husband and father, and a kind neighbor. His wife, six daughters and five sons survive him and they all live at Wishaw. Two of the daughters are married, Mrs. Walter King and Mrs. David King. He had one brother and one sister in this country, whom, with the deceased's family, were at his bedside when he died, and three sisters in Scotland.
