Reynoldsville Business Men Interested Operating Zinc Mine in Missouri.

About two years ago some of our business men were induced to take stock in a company that was being organized to operate for zinc in Missouri and they bought a large interest near Carthage. Mo. After a few months had slipped by there were doubts in the minds of some of those interested as to whether the investment was worth anything or not. J. Van Reed, of this place, went to Missouri and took charge of the territory and began testing it. After overcoming many discouragements and delays, a good vein of zine ore was struck, for which the gentlemen interested can give Mr. Reed a great deal of credit. Had it not been for his perseverance and good management the zinc mine, so far as the Reynoldsville investors are concerned, would have been a fizzle. A large mill, costing \$6,000, for crushing and washing the ore was erected and is now in operation.

The first week in May J. J. Sutter, one of our merchants, who is a stockholder in the zinc mine, went out to Missouri to see the mine and to form some idea for himself of the plant and its value.

In conversation with Mr. Sutter one day last week we learned the following facts concerning the company and the zinc mine they are now operating.

The name of company is the Plymouth Rock Mining Company, composed of J. Van Reed, A. T. McClure, F. D. Smith, Dr. J. C. King, Dr. W. B. Alexander, W. W. Wiley, G. O. Sweitzer, G. J. Corwin, J. J. Sutter, of Reynoldsville, Dr. R. M. Boyle and J. C. Boyle, of Falls Creek, and a Mr. Cook, of Carthage. The company owns five acres of land. The mine is 196 feet deep and the ore is brought to the surface in an fron tub that holds 500 pounds. This tub can be brought out of mine, dumped and sent back again in one minute. Three steam drills are used in mine, but for the comfort of the miners these machines are operated with compressed air. The men drill all day and the blasting is done after men quit work in the evening. The mine is not opened enough yet to run full capacity, but the output is about one hundred tons a day in the rough. It requires as much water to wash the ore as it would to run a grist mill. The company sells the zine at plant for \$32.50 per ton. On the 24th of May they shipped 109,470 pounds. Mr. Sutter had a box of ore shipped home, which arrived here last week, that is 40 per cent zinc. He says all the ore from their mine does not contain quite as much per cent of zinc as the ore he brought home with him, but this ore is a fair average Specimen of the ore can be seen at Seeley. Died In Sykesville.

They are L. H. Duff, of Punxsutawney, James A. and A. M. Duff, of Luthersburg, H. B. Duff, of Pitcairn, Mrs. S. C. Ricard, of Toledo, Ohio, Mrs. J. H. Null, of Sykesville. All her children and all, except two, of her grand children were present at the funeral, which was largely attended by her former friends and associates. Early in life she joined the Cumberland Presbyterian church at Mt. Pleasant. She was a christian women. She passed away peacefully and calmly.

Graham, of Brookville, and Presiding Elder R. C. Smith.


