### THE COMING INSTITUTE.

Grand Array of Day Instructors and Evening Entertainments Secured.

The Jefferson County Teachers' Institute for this year will be held in the Belvedere opera house, in Brookville, on December 29th, 30th, 31st, 1902, and January 1st and 2nd, 1903. Prof. R. B. Teitrick, our efficient county superintendent, has been at work during the whole summer securing talent as day instructors and arranging a course of evening entertainments, and it is gratifying to know that he has been successful even beyond his own expectations, as his list of instructors for this year was never before equaled at an institute in this county, and the same can be justly said of the evening entertainments and entertainers. The day instructors will be Hon. Henry Houck, Deputy State Superintendent; Dr. M. G. Brumbaugh, ex-Commissioner to Porto Rico, who now occupies the chair of Pedagogy at the University of Pennsylvania; Hon. O. T. Corson, ex-Commissioner of Schools, Columbus, Ohio; Dr. S. D. Fess, who holds the chair of History and Science in the Normal University at Ada, Ohio, and Prof. T. S. Gibson, of Ebensburg, Pa., who will conduct the instruction in music. For the evening sessions Prof. Teitrick has secured Dr. N. D. Hillis, of New York, successor to Henry Ward Beecher and Lyman Abbott as pastor of the Plymouth church, Brooklyn, who will deliver his greatest lecture "John Ruskin's Message to the Nineteenth Century," on Tuesday evening; the Mendelssohn Male Quartette, assisted by a soprano soloist and Miss Margurite Smith, of the famous Smith Sisters company, reciter, for Wednesday evening, and Hon. J. P. Dolliver, of Iowa, who will deliver one of his popular lectures on Thursday evening, New Year's night, 1903. Monday evening has not as yet been filled, but Prof. Teitrick has the choice of a number of lecturers and entertainments and he will provide a program for that evening that is in keeping in point of merit with those arranged for the other evenings during the week. The teachers of the county and the friends of education generally can look forward to the coming teachers' institute as an assured success, as the talent secured will undoubtedly make it the greatest institute ever held in this county.—Brookville Republican.
