**Notice to Voters.**

Upon the petition of the freeholders of Washington township, presented to the Court of Quarter Sessions of Jefferson county, on November 24th, 1902, the court made the following order, viz: "And now, Nov. 24, 1902, upon due consideration of the within petition, the court appoints Fred A. Lane, W. C. Smith and McCurdy Hunter, commissioners to enquire into the propriety of dividing the township of Washington, into two or more election districts (disregarding the division of said townships heretofore made for election purposes) so as to suit the convenience of the inhabitants thereof; and it shall be the duty of said commissioners or any two of them, to make a plot or draft of the proposed election districts if the same cannot be fully designated by natural lines or boundaries, all of which they, or any two of them, shall report to the next Court of Quarter Sessions together with their opinion of the same."

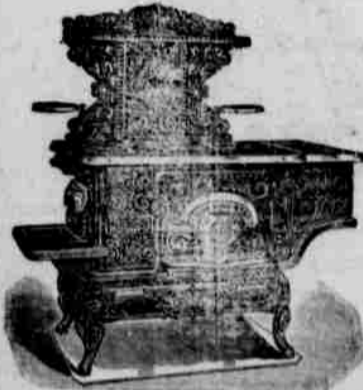
