### Circumstantial Evidence.

Perhaps the most pronounced dramatic hit of years, and one that will live when our children are old men and women, is Sun & Fowler's beautiful production of Circumstantial Evidence, by James M. Martin. For the past ten years Mr. Martin has been making his home in Chicago. One morning he got up and found the papers full of a shocking murder case. It appears one Strong had, in a beastly state of intoxication, whittled his wife to death with a razor. Strong was dressed in a light suit of clothes. He left a saloon on W. Madison street a few minutes before 11.40 p. m., walked six blocks and was found bending over the dead body of his wife at 11.45 p. m., the police having been attracted to the place by his cries. The razor with which the crime was committed was never found. How he could successfully cut his wife's throat without as much as getting a drop of blood on his hands, much less his clothing, some people could never guess, although these facts were fully brought out at the three trials. At the third trial he begged the authorities to have him hypnotized, it being the general belief that while in a soporific state, the subject will speak the exact truth, but even this was denied the poor man and he was hanged according to the requirements of the law a few weeks after. It has since transpired beyond the shadow of a doubt the man was innocent and the real culprit escaped. The trial, conviction and judicial murder of this man so worked upon the feelings of Mr. Martin that he determined to write a drama and call it Circumstantial Evidence. The piece was purchased from Mr. Martin after its completion by Gus Sun and Fred D. Fowler about a year ago and put upon the road. People who have seen the production pronounce it a masterpiece. The author has woven into the play a beautiful love story, bright flashes of comedy blended with the most dramatic and pathetic scenes. The story shows how easy it is for a man to be convicted on Circumstantial Evidence. The hero of the play is all but hanged. He is saved at a moment when seconds are hours. The production in its entirety will be seen in this city at Reynolds opera house January 27th, 1903.

### Value of Drinking Fountains.
