Tours to the Pacific Coast.

News of Interest to the Grangers

February 3rd, 1903, was the thirteenth anniversary of North Elk Run Grange, No. 913, Tloga county. Many visitors were present, among them the Master of Welsboro Grange, who gave a good address. After an interesting program was rendered supper was served and thus a pleasant and profitable evening was enjoyed by all.

Under recent date a good brother writes relative to the order in Clearfield county as follows: "January 23," Home Camp Grange in Union township was organized with 35 charter members. This was a grand meeting, visiting Patrons from miles around gathered in and the large hall was crowded. They start off in splendid shape.

Michigan is making splendid progress in Grange work. The past year 101 Subordinate and 6 Pomona Granges were organized, while 6 new Juvenile Granges have been reported in the State since the meeting of the National Grange held in Lansing November last.

Columbia Grange No. 83, of Bradford county, on January 28 held an all day meeting in observation of the twenty-ninth anniversary of its organization. The morning was devoted to a private meeting when three candidates were initiated in the degrees of Harvester and Husbandman and the general work of the Order. The afternoon social intercourse and consideration of taxation were prominent features, while the evening was occupied with literary, musical and innocent amusements by young

and old, many being in attendance. With an efficient corps of officers, Columbia Grange stands steadfast in the work with "Progress" inscribed upon their banner for 1903.

The members of Fort Grange, No. 951, Huntingdon county, contemplate building a new hall. On Saturday, February 14th, they had a very pleasant and profitable meeting, four new members were received and more are expected. The grange could not be in a more flourishing condition.
