Brookville's New Doctor.

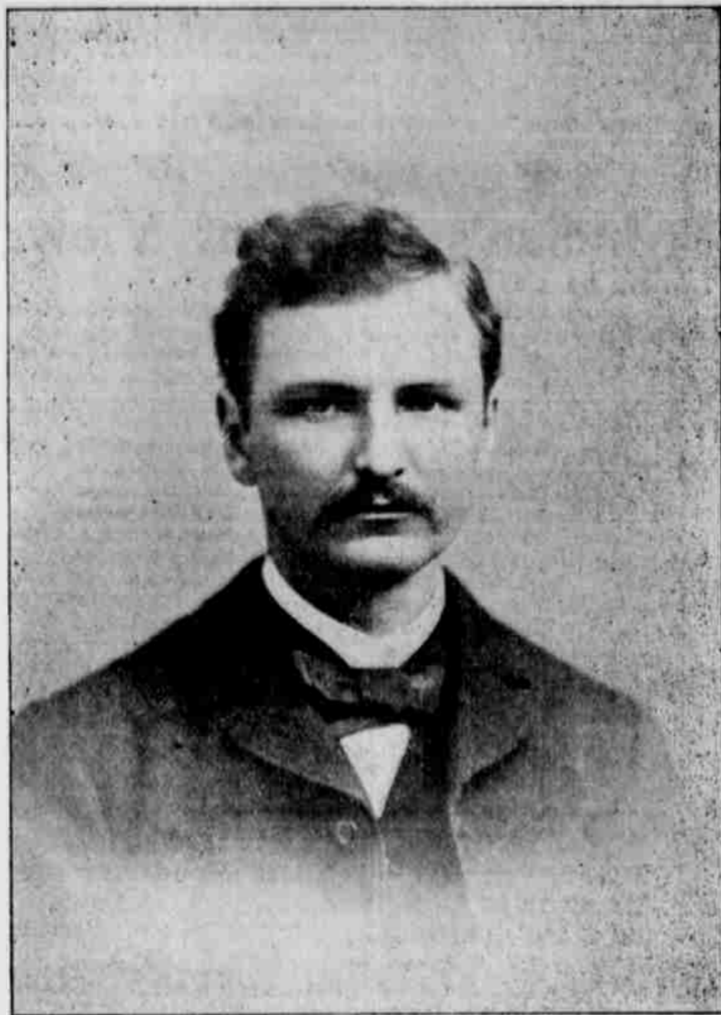

State Appropriation.

The State appropriation for the schools of Jefferson county for 1903 is \$54,818.11. Winslow township gets the largest appropriation in the county—\$4,724.30. McCalmont township is next highest—\$4,531.89—and Young township is next—\$4,470.93. The appropriation for Reynoldsville is \$2,264.31; West Reynoldsville \$823.26; Washington township \$2,757.67; Snyder township \$2,121.62; Punxsutawney \$3,796.72; Florence township \$1,347.50; Henderson \$1,651.74; Falls Creek \$986.07; Brookwayville \$1,722.69; Big Run \$900.45. Worthville receives the lowest amount, \$153.54.
