

The corner stone of the large brick building now being erected by the Reynoldsville Hardware Co.-Francis D. Smith and A. T. McClure-for their own use, was laid on Thursday afternoon, July 23rd, 1903, in the presence of about 200 people. Hon. S. B. Elliott gave a short address, in which he outlined the history and growth of Reynoldsville. A copper box, made by W. L. Fisher, was ready to be placed in the corner stone. The papers and documents to be placed in the box were in the hands of L. J. McEntire, town clerk, and he passed them to Rev. A. J. Mcek, Ph. D., pastor of the Baptist church, one at a time and Rev. Meek announced each one to the people and then passed them to the hand of Francis D. Smith, who placed them in the box held by A. T. McClure, after which the corner stone was immediately laid.
