#### VICTIM OF TYPHOID FEVER.

Lawson Corbett Died in Hospital—His Mother and Sister Down With Fever.

Last April F. G. Corbett moved his family from Prescotville to Sharpsburg and they have since been a sadly afflicted family. Thirteen weeks ago Miss May Corbett took typhoid, from which she is now convalescing. About five weeks ago D. Lawson and Miss Mary were both taken to the St. John's Hospital in Allegheny City suffering with typhoid fever. Ten days ago Mrs. Corbett was stricken with fever and she was taken to St. John's Hospital. Lawson and Mary were not informed of their mother's being taken to the hospital. At 9.05 a. m., Thursday, August 20, 1903, Lawson Corbett died in the hospital from heart failure. His mother and sister, who are dangerously ill with fever, have not been informed of Lawson's death.

Short funeral service was held at the home of F. G. Corbett at 224 Ninth street, Sharpsburg, at 8.00 p. m. Thursday, conducted by Rev. Thompson, pastor of the Sharpsburg Presbyterian church. Friday afternoon Lawson's body was brought to this place and buried in the Reynoldsville cemetery. Rev. A. D. McKay, pastor of Reynoldsville Presbyterian church, met the funeral party at the train and accompanied them to cemetery, where he conducted a short service.

D. Lawson Corbett was born at Prescotville July 21st, 1885, making him 18 years and one month—lacking one day—old at time of death. He was employed in Moorehead Bros. machine shop at Sharpsburg. Lawson was a fine young man and the news of his death was received with sorrow by his numerous young friends at this place.

F. G. Corbett and family have the sympathy of their host of friends in their time of affliction.

#### "The Record" in Error.

Our neighbor, *The Record* of Brookwayville, calls attention to an error in THE STAR last week about John Battista Aiello's first degree verdict being the first verdict of first degree murder in Jefferson county since Chas. Chase was convicted and hung. We acknowledge the error, and stand corrected.

Just to show in a friendly spirit that it is possible for *The Record* to err occasionally, we call attention to an article that appeared in that paper last week concerning the Chase murder case. *The Record* said that Mrs. Betty McDonald was murdered in the Beechwoods on the night of February 19, 1876, the criminals split her head open with a hatchet, killing her almost instantly, that Chase was arrested at Ridgway the next day, tried and convicted, and hanged August 28, 1876. About the only correct part of the above statement is that Mrs. Betty McDonald was murdered in Beechwoods and that Chase was hung for the crime. The murder occurred on the night of February 19, 1867, not 1876; the murderers used a maul, not a hatchet; Chase was arrested near Brookwayville, not Ridgway, and was hung August 28, 1867, not 1876. See?
