The ceremony was performed by Rev. Wm. F. Fleming, of the Clarion Presbyterian church. The bride and groom were attended by Miss Bertha Eggleton, of Brandy Camp, Pa., as bride's maid and Ross W. Clawges, of Brockwayville, as best man. The bride carried a beautiful bouquet of sweet peas and the parlor was prettily decorated with ferns and flowers. Miss Mabel Lucas, of Content, Pa., presided at the organ and assisted by Mr. Lawrence Herman with the violin rendered exquisite music.

After the ceremony and congratulations, a fine wedding dinner was served and soon after the newly wedded couple, accompanied by the groom's parents, drove to Brookville and took the night train for the latter's home near Paic, Pa. As they drove away they were showered with rice, etc., and tin cans and shoes decorated the carriage, and the young folks got the family cat safely stowed under the seat.

The bride is one of Clarion's best young women. She is a graduate of Clarion State Normal and has been a teacher in the public schools for two years. She is loved and respected by a large circle of friends. The groom is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Brown, of Paic, Jefferson county. He is a graduate of Clarion Normal and is a young man of excellent character and business ability. For some time he was in the employ of Jno. F. & G. E. Met Awful Death.

Albert Swanson, of near Eleanor, who was employed as engineer on the pumps at the bottom of the new shaft, met a horrible death while 278 feet underground last Wednesday night. Mr. Swanson went to the shaft as usual, and entering the bucket in the man hole, was lowered to the bottom. Mr. Swanson was due to return in about fifteen minutes, but when that time had expired no signal was given. Conductor Millirens, who is notified by an electric bell when anyone is waiting to be brought up, stood at his post but heard no sound. Finally he became alarmed, and after a conference with the engineer, decided to bring the bucket to the surface. The sight which met their gaze when the bucket came to the surface was an awful one. Swanson's body hung lifeless over the edge of the vessel, the unfortunate man having been literally boiled to death in hot steam. An investigation revealed the fact that when Swanson had gone to the bottom, and before he alighted from the bucket, large steam hose had burst, knocking him senseless, after which the scalding steam soon burned him to death.

The deceased was about 45 years old and is survived by his widow and seven children. His remains were interred in the cemetery at Sugar Hill on Friday. It is understood that the coal company bore the funeral expenses and presented the widow a check for \$1,000.—Punxsutawney Spirit.
