

Death's Ruthless Hand.

Mrs. Jessie McMurray, wife of Harry McMurray, of the Brookville *Jeffersonian Democrat*, died very suddenly at her home in South Brookville on Tuesday afternoon, September 8th, of diphtheria, her illness being of but a few days' duration. Mrs. McMurray's death was so very unexpected that the announcement was to many of our people their first notice of her illness; in fact it came to all as a sure reminder that death is no respecter of persons nor conditions. The deceased visited at Chautauqua with her mother for several weeks, returning home on August 22d. She had been feeling somewhat indisposed for a few days prior to leaving Chautauqua, and this same condition had been troubling her since her return. On Thursday of last week she noticed an irritated condition in her throat, and this her physician thought would prove to be but a slight attack of tonsillitis. On Sunday evening, however, her disease was diagnosed as diphtheria, and while everything that it was possible to do was done for her she continued to grow worse and death followed quickly, but none too soon to relieve her of awful suffering.

Mrs. McMurray was an only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Leibgood, and was the mother of three children, one daughter and two sons, who with her parents and husband survive. She was a most amiable woman, who found her greatest pleasure and enjoyment in the comfort and happiness of her children and loved ones; her home was her paradise, and it was at her own fireside that she endeavored herself to so many of her friends.—*Brookville Republican*.

WE MUST AWAKEN!

An Effort Should be Made to Increase Our Population.

With Reynoldsville's natural advantages the town is not what it should be and not what it would be if more effort and energy were put forth to build up the town and increase the industries to the number the location and advantages warrant.

And now we have reached the time when we are compelled to make an effort to increase the population of Reynoldsville or lose one of our industries. We refer to the silk mill. DuBois people are offering all kinds of inducements to get the Enterprise Silk Co. to build a mill at DuBois, which if successful means that a large part of the machinery in the mill at this place will be moved to DuBois. The silk mill at this place is equipped to employ 350 people, but the Enterprise Silk Co. cannot get more than about half that number of people to work. The people of Reynoldsville should awaken to the situation as it now confronts us and make an effort to increase our population by getting more industries in town, and also encouraging the building of the trolley line to Rathmel, Solider and Sykesville. The towns that are forging ahead to-day are the towns that have live boards of trade or some other such organization.

What You May Shoot.

Following is a summary of the Pennsylvania game laws showing the kinds of game and number that can be killed and the season for each kind: Elk, deer or fawn, two in one year, November only; pheasants, ten in one day, October 15 to December 15; rabbits, unlimited, not to be taken with a ferret, November 1 to December 15; quail, 15 in one day, October 15 to December 15; web-foot wild fowl, unlimited, September 1 to May 1; wild turkey, two in one day, October 15 to December 15; woodcock, ten in one day, October 15 to December 15 and during July; squirrel, grey, black and fox, unlimited, October 15 to December 15; plover, unlimited, July 15 to January 1. All game can be bought and sold in season in this state except elk, deer and fawn, wild turkey, pheasants, quail and woodcock, which have been killed in this commonwealth. These cannot be sold at any time. No game of any kind can be legally transported out of the state. Hunters from other states must pay a license.
