**Foreigners Returning.**

There is at present a remarkable movement on the part of foreigners going back to their native lands in Europe, from all parts of western Pennsylvania, and especially from the Monongahela valley. These include Hungarians, Slovaks, Croations, Poles, Italians and other nationalities engaged in the rough labor which has been so abundant for a few years in this region. It is estimated that in the past few weeks from 4,000 to 5,000 of them have gone from this part of state. They have had great prosperity for some years and have made and saved money, but at the first sign of a slack in production many of them turn to their old homes. They can pay their fares both ways and live through the winter cheaper in the old country than they can remain in America during the winter. The cost of living in the old country is very low—\$2 in United States money being equal to \$5 in Hungarian money. A man who goes back home with \$200 is considered to be in unusually good circumstances for a laborer and is the envy of all who have not been to the United States.—Elizabeth Herald.
