AN ORDINANCE granting the Farmers' Telephone Company of Indiana, Armstrong and Jefferson counties, its successors and assigns permission to erect poles and run wires on the same over the alleys of the borough designated by Council under and subject to the general Ordinance No. 38 relating to telephone poles, etc.

Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same that the Farmers' Telephone Company of Indiana, Armstrong and Jefferson counties, its successors and assigns be and is hereby granted the right of way, and shall have the right to erect poles and run wires on the same over the alleys of the borough or any part thereof designated by council by resolution for the purpose of operating a telephone exchange and telephone lines under and subject to the general ordinance No. 38 of the Borough of Reynoldsville relating to telegraph, telephone poles, etc., and providing regulations pertaining thereto, approved March 1st, 1897, and provided that such company shall on notice of the passage of this ordinance to its attorney cause the same to be advertised as required by law at its cost and expense without remedy over, against the borough and provided further that said telephone company shall within 30 days after the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the secretary of the Town Council its certificate of acceptance of all the conditions and provisions of said general ordinance, No. 38, which certificate of acceptance shall be executed under the corporate seal of said company duly attested by the president and secretary thereof, otherwise this ordinance and all proceedings had thereunder immediately becomes null and void and of no effect. It is further provided that said telephone company before making practical use of any of its lines in the borough, in consideration of grant of the right to the use of the poles of the company by the borough for conveying electric fire alarm wires shall be permitted free of expense to the borough.

Section 2. The said company is to be responsible for all damages caused in erecting, maintaining and operating said lines. The poles when placed in said alleys are to be so as not to interfere with any sewerage now built or hereafter to be built. The wires of said Telephone Company, telegraph company or other telephone company nearer than two (2) feet to the wires of said other company. In case of the violation of this section (excepting damage clause) it shall be the duty of the street Commissioner to notify the offending company to remove its wires, poles or fixtures so erected in violation thereof within three (3) days of such notification and on failure to comply with such notice it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to remove the same forthwith at the expense of the offending party or company.

Section 3. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed so far as the same effects this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE granting the Jefferson Traction Company the right to lay street car tracks on certain streets and alleys mentioned in section one.

Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same that the consent of the said council is hereby given to the Jefferson Traction Company, a corporation chartered by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to construct, maintain and operate a passenger street railway by the use of electric power, or power other than steam or horse power as may from time to time be determined with the necessary apparatus and mechanical fixtures for applying and operating the same and for that purpose to erect upon and occupy Deitz Alley from Bradford street west to Eighth street or Charles street and Eighth or Charles street from Deitz Alley to Jackson street, and First street from Jackson to Main street, with single track with the necessary sidings, turnouts and switch-ways, if post and poles are erected to maintain and operate electric system for the supply of motive power, said erection is to be subject to reasonable regulations by the Borough Council for the public convenience and safety. Subject however to all the limitations and conditions as reserved by the Borough in Ordinance, No. 79, granting the right of way to the Puncstutaway Street Passenger Railway Company.

Section 2. Any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance is hereby repealed so far as the same effects this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE regulating all telegraph, telephone, electric light and electric railway poles and the taxation and inspection of the same, etc., in the streets, lanes and alleys of the Borough of West Reynoldsville.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, in council assembled and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that whenever permission shall have been granted by council to any firm, corporation or individual to construct a line of telegraph, telephone, electric light or electric railway poles in or upon any street, lane, alley or public square of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, it shall be the duty of the said firm, corporation or individual, before any poles shall be erected, to submit to the Street Committee and Borough Clerk, a written application specifying the number and size of poles intended to be erected and designate the places where the same are to be inserted and if no objections are made thereto, it shall be the duty of the Borough Clerk to issue a license to said applicant for the erection of the specified poles at the designated places of insertion; in case of objections being made to the whole or any part of such application, it shall be the duty of the Street Committee to hear the same and grant the license with the application or with such conditions and modifications to secure the purposes of this ordinance as the case may require. No poles shall be newly erected without the license granted by the Street Committee, certified by the Clerk, shall bear a distinctive number, together as provided by this section, and for every such license so granted there shall be paid to the Borough Treasurer, the sum of fifty cents for each pole.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Street Committee to cause a thorough inspection to be made at least once every year of all telegraph, telephone, electric light or electric railway poles erected within the corporate limits of the Borough of West Reynoldsville and if any pole shall be found defective from any cause, the owner thereof, or any person, firm or individual owning such pole who shall forthwith replace the same with a sound pole, and if the said owner refuses or neglects to replace such defective poles within forty-eight hours after receiving such notification, he, they or it shall be liable to a fine of five dollars for each pole so neglected or refused to be replaced, to be collected as debts of like amount are now by law recoverable.

Section 3. All telegraph, telephone, electric light and electric railway poles now erected or hereafter to be erected in the Borough of West Reynoldsville, which are or shall be owned by any firm, individual or corporation, shall be designated by the names or initials of such owner, and each of such poles shall bear a distinctive number, together with the names or initials and the number shall be legibly marked in oil paint upon the poles so designated; it shall be the duty of every such owner or owners annually on the first Monday of January in each year, to make application to the Street Committee and Clerk for a license to maintain the poles heretofore erected for the ensuing year, specifying the poles to be maintained by their proper designation as provided for in this section, and the Street Committee shall cause the Clerk to issue a license to such applicants, which shall authorize the maintenance of the poles designated in the application only for a period of one year from the first day of January next ensuing the date of said application and the charge of issuing such a license shall

be the sum of fifty cents for each and every pole authorized to be maintained thereby and shall be paid to the Borough Treasurer for the use of the Borough.

Section 4. No telegraph, telephone, electric light or electric railway pole shall be maintained within the corporate limits of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, without an annual license for the maintenance of the same shall have been previously granted in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of this ordinance. Any privilege heretofore granted by resolution or ordinance for the erection or maintenance of poles for any of said purposes are hereby repealed. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to a fine of five dollars for each and every pole so maintained without a license, to be recovered as debts of like amount are now by law recoverable.

Section 5. By complying with the provisions and requirements of this ordinance, the privileges heretofore granted to individuals, corporations or companies by resolution or ordinance shall not be in any way affected.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.
