Mrs. Campbell was a resident of Reynoldsville a number of years ago, when her husband was engaged in the planing mill business at this place. The mill was located on corner of Main and First streets. It was destroyed by fire. Mr. Campbell died in the West a number of years ago.

The Brockwayville Record in speaking of her death says: "Mrs. Campbell was loved by all who were acquainted with her and she leaves a host of friends who mourn her death. The deceased was 64 years old and lived in Beechwoods nearly all her life."
