It is only a conjecture with the officials at Brookville as to what influence was brought to bear on the Governor that he granted a respite. It is stated by some that a petition was presented to the Governor asking for the respite, while others report that the Italian Consul at Philadelphia requested a respite until after the Board of Pardons meets. The board will hold two meetings before the time fixed for the execution, January 20 and Febru-

Aiello and Pallone are feeling very jubilant over the respite, and they hope to have their sentence commuted to life imprisonment.
