THE LOCAL REPUBLICANS ADOPT NEW BY-LAWS.

Rules and Regulations which will Govern Nominating of Candidates for Municipal Offices in the Borough of Reynoldsville Adopted Wednesday Evening, January 20, 1904.

1 The local members of the Republican County Committee shall meet and choose a date for holding a suggestion meeting, which date shall be ten days or more preceeding the time of holding the primaries. They shall give at least ten days notice of such suggestion meeting by posting ten or more written or printed notices in conspicuous places and by publication in at least one local paper. The committee shall also choose a date for holding the primaries and shall give ten days notice of the same in the same manner as prescribed for holding the suggestion meeting.

2 In odd years the suggestion meeting shall be held in the First Precinct Hose House and in even years it shall be held in the Second Precinct Hose House.

3 At such suggestion meeting candidates shall be suggested for all the borough offices to be filled at the Februeffect a cure—as it has done before in placed on the number of candidates to

4 Candidates named at the suggestion meeting shall each pay to the Local Republican Committee a fee of one dollar to pay the expenses of printing tickets and bolding the primaries. Upon failure of any candidate to pay the said fee within five days after the suggestion meeting, his name shall be stricken from the ticket.

5 The committee shall cause tickets to be printed, bearing the names of candidates named at the suggestion meeting, and no others; but blank lines shall be provided in which the names of any persons not named at the suggestion meeting may be inserted by the voter. The ticket shall also state the number to be voted for for each office.

PRIMARY ELECTIONS

6 A primary election shall be hold in each voting precinct under the direction of the local members of the Republican County Committee for the precinct in which it occurs, and shall be conducted by one judge and two inspectors to be designated by the committee. The primary in each preci et shall be held on the same date and the polls shall be opened at three o'clock p. m. and be closed at eight o'clock p. m. No vote shall be received before the hour of opening or after the hour of closing the polls. The judge and inspectors chosen to hold the election shall be sworn to perform their duries as the election boards are sworn at general elections.

7 The qualifications for voting at the republican borough primaries shall be the same as those of the general election and the primary election officers shall refuse to receive the vote of any person not so qualified. These qualifications to apply to the primary election the same as though it were a general election. No votes except those of republicans shall be received by the primary election officers and if any person be challenged on his politics he shall be sworn to a statement setting forth the fact that he voted for the candidate heading the republican ticket the last general election, or that he will vote for the entire republican ticket nominated by the primary at which he is offering to vote.

8 Immediately after the polls are closed the election boards shall proceed to count the votes for the several candidates and ascertain the result. The officers shall also make, sign and post in a conspicuous place at each election house a statement showing the total vote received by each candidate, for the inspection of voters. After counting the votes the election boards of the several precincts shall immediately confer and make out the returns declaring the candidates having received the highest number of votes to be duly nominated. The returns, when completed shall be signed by all the members of each election board, whereupon they shall appoint one of their number to file the same with the county commissioners in due time and manner as prescribed by law.

9 Two correct lists of voters shall be kept; also two tally sheets. One list of voters and one tally sheet together with all tickets voted shall be preserved by the judge of each election precinct for a period of thirty days, after which, if there be no contest, he shall destroy the same without permitting the ballots to be examined by any one.

10 All rules or parts of rules adopted by the republican voters of this borough at any previous meeting, inconsistent with the foregoing are berby annulled.


