#### Summerville 'Phone Improvements. At a meeting of the directors of the

summerville Telephone Company in this place one day last week orders were issued which will result in giving Punxsutawney the best and most improved telephone service over that line now obtainable. Just as soon as the supplies can be procured, the weather permitting, the work of reconstruction will be begun. The plan to be introduced is known as the Central Energy transmitted on overhead wires, differsystem, in that two metalic wires are used to complete the circuit whereas in the present system the ground constitutes half of it. The wires thus used are carried from one central point to another in cable formations which will be extended out of town for a mile or more. By this means noise and interruptions, caused by various influences will be eliminated. A new switchboard will be installed in the local office with accommodations for 300 phones. The old phones will be replaced by nev instruments of modern type. In this system the batteries are located in the central office and the phones are conse quently not equipped with a cell box at


