A Growing Tribe of Red Men.

Pukeeshono Tribe, No. 205, improve-Order of Red Men, initiated a class of over one hundred candidates last Thurs day evening and established a record among secret societies in Punxsutaw The Tribe was organized ten months ago with a charter membership of 42 and at the present time has 223 members with every prospect of excoeding the 300 mark by May 5th, when the charter will close. One pathetic incident of the recent initiation was the death of the goat. About the middle of the degree work a slight twitching of his nostrils denoted nervousness, but it was thought to be but momentary and would soon pass off. But to the consternation of the members he suddenly paused, gazed with blood-shot eyes on the candidates and with a plaintive "m-a-a!" sank exhausted to the floor and expired-a victim of overwork. Many of the candidates, however, who had seen the fearful and wonderful convolutions, contertions and grimaces of others on the goat's back heaved a sigh of relief and sald that his loss was their gain. Poor Billy! His death was a most pathetic one, and it only goes to prove that a goat may stand a great deal of hard work but not initiation of over one hundred candidates in one night. Some contended that the goat had been starved to death, but a post mortum examination revealed the fact that he had eaten for his supper 7 tomato cans, 2 suits of underwear off of somebody's clothes line, 5 old gum boots, 4 pounds of nails, 6 quart bottles and a number of small vials, a lot of barbwire and two joints of stove pipe. 
