The annual examinations for the teachers of Jefferson county will be held as follows: Tuesday, June 21, Stanton; Wednesday, June 22, Worthville; Thursday, June 23, Summerville; Friday, June 24, Richardsville; Saturday, June 25, Rockdale Mills; Wednesday, June 29, Perryville; Thursday, June 30, Punksutawney; Friday, July 1, Reynoldsville; Saturday, July 2, Brookwayville; Tuesday, July 5, Sigel; Wednesday, July 6, Corsica; Thursday, July 7, Cool Spring; Friday, July 8, Frostburg; Saturday, July 9, Brookville.

Saturday, August 27, Brookville. Examinations will begin at 8:00 o'clock, a. m. Applicants will hand to the Superintendent a stamped envelope addressed to himself (or herself). This envelope should contain the last certificate or "grades" received.

All applicants are required to be examined in Algebra and Civil Government. A comprehensive knowledge of the common school branches will be required.

No certificates will be issued before July 15. Directors should note this in selecting dates for the electing of teachers.
