Now, THEREFORE, Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, Pa., and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authori-

1. That the bid of T. E. Evans. above recited, be and the same is bereby accepted, (wire cut paving block to be used of the manufacture above stated.) 2. The bond of the said T. E. Evans with sureties, as filed with the Clerk of Council, is hereby approved.

3. James B. Caldwell, Esq., Brookville, Pa., is hereby designated as engineer in charge of said work.

AN ORDINANCE—To amend section six of Ordinance No. 3, relating to the adoption and regulation of streets, alleys, and side-walks.

Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville in council assembled and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same: That section six of Ordinance No. 3 relating to the six of Ordinance No. 3 relating to the adoption and regulation of streets, alleys, and side-walks, which now reads as follows: "That all plank walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough, west to Broadway street shall be six feet wide, thence to Brown street, shall be five feet four inches in width, thence to west line of the Borough, four feet wide: and on Broadway street side-walks shall be five feet four inches in width, and on all other streets shall be four feet in width; the said side-walks to have an inclination of one-fourth of an inch to the foot towards the street.

Plank shall be not less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid cross wise and well spiked upon three sound sawed stringers, to be not less than 3x5 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the outside stringer they shall be attacked together by having a campling attached together by having a coupling board one inch thick and three fee long, same width as said stringers, well spiked to each end on the inside of each of the outside lines of stringers. said stringers to be placed upon stone or timber foundations or supports, at a distance of every five and one-third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the two outside lines of stringers to be not more than two inches from the end of the plank,' be and the same is hereby amended so

that it shall read as follows:
Section Six. That all side-walks on
Main street from the creek on line
adjoining Reynoldsville Borough west
to Broadway street shall be six feet wide: that all side-walks on line of lots abutting upon the following unmed streets. viz., Main. Ohio, Powers, Central, Warner, Arms, Baxter, First Avenue, Second Avenue, Water, Brond-way, Brown, Lewis, Erie, shall be five feet, four Inches in width: the said side walks to have an inclination towards the street of one-fourth of an inch to the foot. The plank, when used, shall be not less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid cross wise and well spiked upon three sound sawed stringers, to be not less than 3x5 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the outside stringer they shall be attached by a coupling board one inch thick and three feet long, same width as the said stringers, well spiked to each end on the inside of each of the outside lines of stringers. The said stringers to be placed upon stone or timber foundations or supports, at a distance of every five and one third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the outside lines of stringers to be not more than two inches from the end of the plank, and the inside lines of said side-walks shall correspond with the lines of owners of property abutting upon the said several streets.
