Those who know them have no doubt that they will keep their word.

If these things are not all they ought to be does not duty call upon you to do what you can to help to make them right? That man is living in a low plain indeed who does not feel a desire to leave his portion of the world, however small it may be, better than he found it.

The next session of the Pennsylvania Legislature will, in all human probability, reapportion the State into Representative and Senatorial districts. The Constitution of the Commonwealth clearly prescribes that this shall be ione immediately after each decennial The Governor and every member of both branches of the legislature takes a solemn oath to support the Constitution of Pennsylvania, and how any man could deliberately oppose apportionment and not regard himself as a perjurer, is something we could never understand. The law-making authorities should be the first to set the example of fidelity to the supreme law of the State, and how they can ask or expect to retain the respect and confidence of their constituents while openly defying an unequivocal mandate of the Constitution is past ordinary compre

AN ORDINANCE—To amend section six of Ordinance No. 3, relating to the adoption and regulation of streets, alleys, and side-walks.

Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the Borough of West Reynoidsville in council assembled and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same: That section six of Ordainance No. 3 relating to the adontion and regulation of attention adoption and regulation of streets, alleys, and side-walks, which now reads as follows: "That all plank walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough, west to Broadway street shall be six feet wide, thence to Brown street, shall be wide, thence to Brown street, shall be five feet four inches in width, thence to west line of the Borough, four feet wide; and on Broadway street side-walks shall be five feet four inches in width, and on all other streets shall be four feet in width; the said side-walks to have an inclination of one-fourth of an

have an inclination of one-fourth of an inch to the foot towards the street. Plank shall be not less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid cross wise and well spiked upon three sound sawed stringers, to be not less than 3x5 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the outside stringer they shall be attached together by having a coupling board one inch thick and three feet long, same width as said stringers, well spiked to each end on the inside of each of the outside lines of stringers. The said stringers to be placed upon stone or said stringers to be placed upon stone or timber foundations or supports, at a distance of every five and one-third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the two outside lines of stringers to be not more than two inches from the end of the plank," be and the same is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows:

Section Six. That all side-walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough west to Broadway street shall be six feet wide: that all side-walks on line of lots abutting upon the following named streets, viz., Main, Ohio, Powers, Central, Warner, Arms, Baxter, First Avenue, Second Avenue, Water, Broadway, Brown, Lewis, Eric, shall be five feet, four inches in width; the said side walks to have an inclination towards the street of one-fourth of an inch to the foot. The plank, when used, shall be not less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid cross wise and well spiked upon three sounds awed stringers, to be not less than 3x5 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the ction Six. That all side-walks on break joints, and at every joint of the outside stringer they shall be attached by a coupling board one inch thick and three feet long, same width as the said stringers, well spiked to each end on the inside of each of the outside lines of ringers. The said stringers to be aced upon stone or timber foundations supports, at a distance of every five third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the outside lines of stringers to be not re than two inches from the end of plank, and the inside lines of said de-walks shall correspond with the lines of owners of property abutting upon the said several streets.

A la carte breakfast and luncheon are served on the Manhattan limited leaving Pittsburg at 3.35 a. m. daily for New York.




