

Be it ordained and enacted by the own council of the Borough of West town council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville in council assembled and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same : That section six of Ordinance No. 3 relating to the adoption and fegulation of streets, alleys, and side-walks, which now reads as follows : "That all plank walks on Main street from the owned on line as follows: "That all plank walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough, 'west to Broadway street shall be six feet wide, thence to Brown street, shall be five feet four inches in width, thence to west line of the Borough, four feet wide; and on Broadway street side-walks shall be five feet four inches in width, and on all other streets shall be width, and on all other streets shall be four feet in width; the said side-walks to have an inclination of one-fourth of an inch to the foot towards the street.
