Music.

The Music Department of the Reynoldsville Business College opened today with Prof. H. E. C. Kaufmann, graduate of the Royal Conservatory of Music, Leipzig, Germany, in charge. Plan of instruction, tuition, etc., as follows:

Entrances and Classification—Beginners are received at any time of the year, and a careful examination is made as to the proficiency of the pupil on entering. Students may enter any grade for which they are found qualified. Once in each term a critical examination is made before promotion to a higher grade.

Plan of Instruction—The courses in piano-forte, organ, violin, violoncello, mandolin and guitar are divided into six grades. Grades one to three require from one and one half to two years, and grades from four to six, two to three years, according to ability and application.

Certificates and Diplomas—Certificates are granted upon satisfactory completion of the fourth and fifth grades of any of the full courses. Diplomas are only granted upon the satisfactory completion of the sixth grade.

Tuition—Lessons are of about forty-five minutes duration. Piano, organ, violin, violoncello, guitar, mandolin and banjo, \$10.00 for each 20 lessons, (payable one half at first lesson and balance at 11th lesson.) Harmony, counterpoint orchestration \$5.00 per term. Orchestra and club lessons on application.

EXPLOSION AND FIRE.

Air Line Burst—Compressor Building Burned—Engineer Had Narrow Escape.

At two o'clock on Wednesday morning of last week there was an explosion and fire at Big Soldier mine. The air line burst in the compressor building and in a few seconds the entire building was on fire. One of the compressors was not working properly and Engineer George Buhite was working at the machine when the air line burst, but fortunately he was far enough away from the pipe to escape sudden death. The explosion extinguished all the lights in the building, but Mr. Buhite stuck to his post of duty and began feeling around in the dark to shut off the four compressors but by the time he had shut off the last one the flames had spread so rapidly that he had to jump out of a window to save himself from being burned to death. The steam pipe at west end of compressor room burst and tore a large section of the sheet iron roof of the adjoining building. The damage to compressors and buildings will amount to two or three thousand dollars at least. It is almost a miracle that no person was killed or seriously injured.

Engineer Buhite has been employed in the fire room and compressor room at Big Soldier thirteen years and has had compressors to work like the one did Wednesday morning, but always before he succeeded in getting them to work all right again.

We understand that a petition has been presented to court and viewers have been appointed for the opening of a new public road from north end of Fifth street out to connect with the Rathmel road near Kilne's or Doan's. We also understand that there will be strong opposition against opening this road on the grounds that there are now two roads leading to the point where the proposed road will connect with Rathmel road and that the new road would be a damage to the town's water supply, as the road would cross the small run at two or three different points.

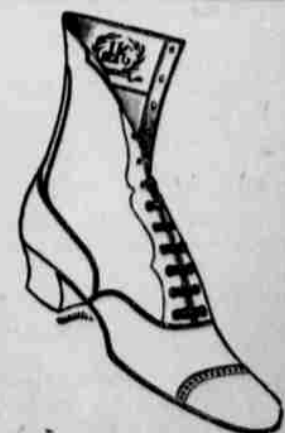

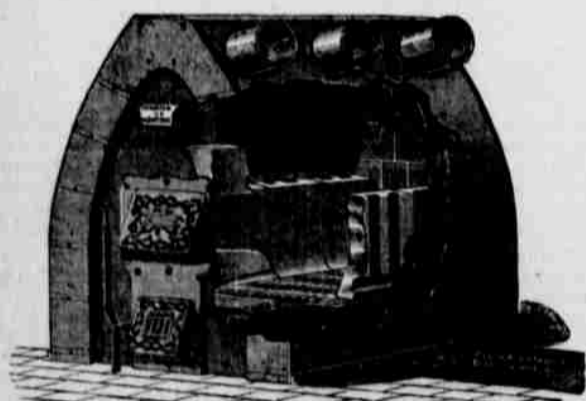
