Some time after the train of ompty cars had been put in on branch and before 5.40 some person, either mallclously or otherwise, threw the switch for the Wishaw branch and when engine No. 4, with a train of empty cars, came down from Falls Creek, running at a high rate of speed, it crashed into the cars on the Wishaw branch. Mrs. John Reed Died Sunday Afternoon After a Long and Painful Illness. Interment at DuBoss

Mrs. Catherine Reed, wife of Mr. John Reed, assistant general manager of the Jefferson & Clearfield Coal & Iron Company, peacefully passed from pain and suffering in this life to the joys of the heavenly land at 2.20 p. m. Sunday, November 13, 1904.
