1.000 SLAUGHTERED.

Followers of False Prophet Shot Down by Peasants.

An uprising is reported from the province of Altai, Siberia. As a result some 1,000 Kalmack tribesmen have been slaughtered. The Kalmacks, who are exceedingly blood-thirsty, have been stirred to a frenzy high priest, Airod by name, who has claimed to be endowed with prophetic powers, and whose stories of com-ing greatness for the tribe were accepted as gospel by his deluded followers.

Fearing trouble, the government some time ago armed the peasants with modern rifles, and it being reported that an uprising was imminent. let them loose against the Kalmacks. A fearful slaughter followed, the clubs of the tribesmen being of no use against the bullets of their opponents. and after the fight was over more than 1,000 tribesmen were found dead, while many others were badly


