

STREET RY. OFFICERS ELECTED.

Board of Directors Declares Semi-Annual Dividend of Two Per-Cent.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Jefferson Traction Company was held at this place Saturday afternoon at which officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: J. A. Hill, Towanda, Pa., president; D. H. Clark, of this place, vice president, treasurer and general manager; B. M. Clark, Esq., also of this place, secretary; board of directors, J. A. Hill, George Black, of Wilkesburg, B. M. Clark and D. H. Clark, S. Ed. Wilson, of Maury, Pa., and E. F. Kiser, of Towanda, stockholders in the company, were also present.

The affairs of the company were found to be in excellent condition and the board of directors declared the usual two per cent semi-annual dividend. A proposition to construct 17 miles of city and suburban street railroad at Stroudsburg, Monroe county, was received and discussed at some length, but will not be disposed of finally until later this year.

The company now owns and operates almost 30 miles of street car line in this vicinity, which represents an outlay of about \$600,000 for road and equipment. Under the present management a system of operating the road has been perfected which is second to none in this part of the state, and the line has become one of the most valuable properties in the county. Some important extensions to the road were discussed at the meeting but no definite action will be taken in the matter until spring—*Pennsylvanian Spirit.*
