THE HAND OF DEATH

ENDS THE CAREER OF ROBERT

ATMORE SHAFFER.

He was a Veteran of the Spanish-Amer-

ican War and also Served in the

earthly career. Atmore Shaffer was born in Reynoldsville November 24, 1876 and died at 8.30 p. m. Friday, March 17, 1905, making him 28 years, 3 months and 21 days old at time of death. At the time of the Spanish-American war, 1898, when volunteers were called for, Mr. Shaffer enlisted in Company L. Sixteenth Regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers July 15, 1898, and was honorably discharged December 28, 1898, on account of end of war. February 28, 1899, he enlisted for three years' service in Company M, Second United States Infantry. January 2, 1902, he was commissioned Corporal in Company M. The 22nd of March, 1902, he was honorably discharged on account of having faithfully served the term of his enlistment. During the three year service he was in four or five hard battles in the Phillipine Islands.

June 24, 1903, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Burge, who with a six-month-old daughter, survives him. With the exception of his army life Mr. Shaffer resided in Reynoldsville

The past two years he was a brakeman on the Low Grade Division of the P. R. R.

Funeral service was held in the M. E. church Monday afternoon, conducted by the paster of church, Rev. J. A. Parsons, assisted by Rev. A. D. McKay, Rev. A. J. Meek and Rev. J. C. Mc-Entire. It was a large funeral. Interment was made in the Reynoldsville Cemetery. The Sons of Veterans turned out and buried the young veteran with military honors.
