**Sykesville.**

Hugh Hall, a well known resident of this place, was killed by being run over by a train on the B. R. & P. between this and Stanley on Friday afternoon about two o'clock. Mr. Hall was on his way to Stanley to transact some business and then intended to take the three o'clock train for DuBois. He was walking on the north bound track and stepped over onto the south bound track to let a train pass and in doing so stepped in front of a train going in the opposite direction, which he did not notice. His body was taken to DuBois for burial. Mr. Hall is survived by his wife, one daughter and one son, who lives in DuBois, and one son in one of the western states. Mr. Hall was about sixty-one years old at the time of his death.

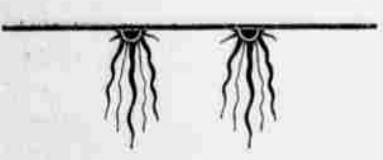
