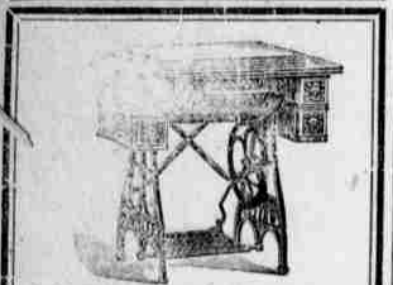

MURDER AT WISAW. Jemaro Gagliardi Shot Wednesday Night—Died in Hospital Sunday. Wednesday night of last week, or early Thursday morning, some person, supposed to have been Antoni Perquit, went to home of Jemaro Gagliardi, an Italian at Wisaw, raised a window and shot Gagliardi four times, from the effects of which he died in the Adrian Hospital at five o'clock Sunday evening. The murderer escaped.
