AN ORDINANCE providing for the grading, paving, curbing, etc., of that part of Jackson street which lies be-tween the west side of Seventh street on the west and the east side of Bradford street on the east.

WHEREAS, A large number of persons owning real property abutting upon that part of Jackson street in the borough of Reynoldsville which lies between the west side of Seventh street on the west, and the east side of Brad-ford street on the east, which is now laid out and opened in said borough, have presented to the town council of Interest paid on time deposits at The Peoples National Bank.

Caldwell for the grading, paving and curbing of parts of said Jackson street (subject to certain changes and altera-tions made by the council, previous to the passage of this ordinance, which are hereby approved as changed and altered, and are as changed and altered hereto attached and made part of this ordinance, saving and excepting that said paving is not to exceed to the width of eighteen feet between curb lines as prayed for in said petition of property owners; ) that two-thirds of the costs and expenses of the same are to be collected from the owners of the real estate bounding or abutting thereon by an equal assessment on the feet front bounding or abutting as aforesaid. in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, relating there to and regulating the same : John C Hirst is designated by the council to estimate said equal assessment, the remainder of such cost to be born by the borough of Reynoldsville.

Sec. 4. The bids to be made shall be for the completed work by the squar-yard, measurements to be made from the inside of both curbs. Said bids shall be sealed and filed with the secretary of the council, not later than 4.00 o'clock on the 25th day of July, A. D. 1905.
