Building New Houses.

The Buffalo & Susquehanna company, which has been at work for several months at their new shaft at Big Run, and which is now fast nearing completion, expect to have the same ready in a short time for the shipment of coal and are already making preparations for the accommodation of the men who are to be employed at the works.
The opening at Big Run will be a large one at which several hundred men will be employed and it is the hopes of the company to be in position to ship coal from the same in a couple months.

Bids have been received for the erection of forty new houses at Big Run and it is expected that work on the same will be commenced in a few days. The houses will be modern mining houses with collars and stone wall foundations.
The same company will also erect twenty new houses at their No. 2 shaft near this city. These house will be of the same high class as those to be erected at Big Run.—Sykesville Post-Dispatch.

Died at Age of 105.

Robert Baird dropped dead while working in the garden at his home at Delancy, Jefferson county, on Saturday afternoon. Heart disease caused his sudden death. Mr. Baird was one hundred and five years of age and was undoubtedly the oldest individual residing in this section of the county. In spite of his advanced years he was hale and hearty and his death was entirely unexpected.
Mr. Baird had taken little interest in elections for many years, in fact it was said that up until a week ago Saturday he had not cast a ballot since the Civil War. On Saturday, the 17th, he declared his intention of voting and he went to the polls and voted for John W. Reed for the nomination for the judgeship of Jefferson county. Mr. Baird is survived by children who are octogenarians.—DuBois Courier.

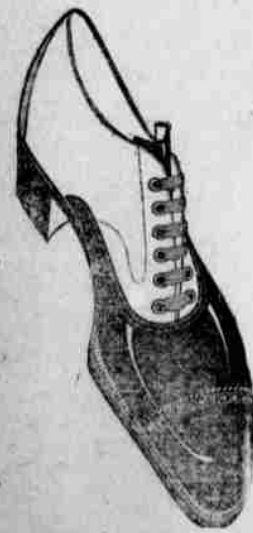
