How to Use a Telephone.

PUNXSUTAWNEY BAPTISTS

Will Dedicate New \$30,000 Church Next Sunday Morning.

There will be no preaching in the Baptist church on Sunday morning next on account of the dedication of the new Baptist church at Punxsutawney. The dedication sermon will be preached at 10.30 a. m. by Rev. J. H. Harris, D. D., L. L. D., president of Bucknell University at Lewisburg, Pa. Rev. C. A. Hare, D. D., of Lewisburg, Pa., financial agent of Bucknell University, will have charge of the finances. The Punxsutawney church is a neat buff brick building, modern in every respect, and about 108 feet long and 50 feet wide, with an auditorium about 48 feet square with circular pews, magnificent pipe organ and beautiful frescoing. Also large gallery and large Sunday school room, with eight separate class rooms, an open baptistry and beautifully designed art glass windows. The total cost of the property in the neighborhood of \$30,000.00, with a seating capacity of 1,000, and a fair prospect of the dedication freeing the property from debt. The pastor, Rev. Charles H. Fitzwilliam, deserves much credit for his wise planning and indomitable courage in the great undertaking which has been brought to a completion. The church also deserves great praise for its determined and persistent work. A number of the local pastors will take part in the exercises, viz: Rev. J. E. Dean, Rev. L. S. Hankins, Rev. J. W. Crawford, Rev. Dr. A. J. Meek and others. Persons who wish to attend the dedication should take the street car at 8.40 Sunday morning. Rev. Dr. Meek will return to Reynoldsville on Sunday in time for the evening service and will preach on the subject, "The Throne of Grace."
