ROBBERS AT PRESCOTTVILLE. Enter Stiles' Store, as Discovered and When Escaping Shot F. G. Corbett. Early Sunday evening, about 7:30, two robbers entered the store of M. H. Stiles in Prescottville by cutting a light of glass out of a side window near rear end of the store and began deliberately to select the goods they wanted to carry away with them. There was no light in the store and the robbers lighted matches occasionally to aid them in getting what they wanted. Mrs. Lydick, who resides opposite the store, saw the men in store and became suspicious and notified her neighbors. About a dozen men of the town surrounded the store. The robbers had taken off the front door lock after gaining an entrance into the store and when they knew that the store had been surrounded by citizens they made a bold break out of the front door, shooting as they ran. F. G. Corbett, who was one of the citizens in front of the store, was shot in the right breast, but the bullet struck the breast bone and glanced to right side, inflicting a sore, but not serious, flesh wound. The bullet was a .38-caliber. It was a very narrow escape for Mr. Corbett. The robbers got away. One of them was tall and the other one was a short heavy man. The circumstances indicate that the work was done by persons familiar with the store. Boys' Dormitory Burned. The boys' dormitory at the Indiana State Normal school was completely destroyed by fire on Friday afternoon of last week, between the hours of four and six o'clock. The origin of the fire, which started in the basement of the building, is unknown. The flames spread rapidly after getting through the first floor. Had the fire occurred at night there would have been an awful tale of loss of life. The loss on building, furnishings, personal effects of the teachers and students is estimated at \$50,000, with \$8,000 insurance on the building. The trustees of the Normal claim that a shortage of water was responsible for the destruction of the dormitory and it is likely that immediate action will be taken to secure damage from the water company.
