BASKET BALL LEAGUE.

High Schools of the County Meet and Effect an Organization.

At a meeting of representatives from the several high schools of the county, held at Brookville December 19th, a basket ball league was organized and the following rules were adopted: 1st, The organization shall be called the Jefferson County Basket Ball League. 2nd, The officers shall be chairman, secretary and treasurer, to be elected at a regular meeting to be held on the first Saturday in November of each year. 3d, The principal of each school shall be responsible for his team and guarantee. 4th, No person shall be eligible for a league team who is not a regular student or principal of the school which the team represents. 5th, Each team shall be entitled to one official, who shall not be a member of the school which he represents, except by special agreement of all the managers of league teams. 6th, Spalding rules shall be used exclusively, except where they conflict with these rules. All decisions in technical points on all adopted rules shall be decided by majority vote of regular selected referees. 7th, A uniform schedule of games shall be formulated by managers of league teams. The same number of games shall be played between the same teams of each place unless otherwise agreed between the two contesting teams. 8th, The team winning the greater number of games from the official schedule, in accordance with adopted rules, shall be awarded the championship banner. Said banner to be purchased and awarded by regular selected referees. 9th, Any High school team in Jefferson county is eligible to join this league and shall be admitted if it receives a majority vote at a meeting of delegates composed of one delegate from each member's team. 10th, There shall be an initiation fee of two dollars. This fee to be used for purpose of purchasing banner and defraying other general expenses. 11th, Guarantees shall be as agreed upon between contesting teams. 12th, These rules may be amended by two-thirds vote at a meeting of delegates composed of one delegate from each league team.

Representatives from the following High schools were present: Reynoldsville, Brookville, Falls Creek, Sigel, Brookwayville, Snyder and Beechwoods. W. M. Jones, of Beechwoods, was chosen chairman. Three of the above schools, Reynoldsville, Brookville and Beechwoods, have signed the league, the other schools being delayed until they secure a suitable building for play. The opening game of the league will be played between Beechwoods and Brookville at Beechwoods, January 19, 1906. The complete official schedule will be published later.
