VICTIM OF PARALYSIS.

Mrs. Matilda Klingensmith Died in Pittsburgh—Buried in Paradise.

Mrs. H. K. Klingensmith died at her home at No. 3344 Penn Avenue, Pittsburgh, about eight o'clock Friday evening, February 16, 1906. Sometime Thursday she was stricken with paralysis. She was alone when stricken and it is not known what time of the day it occurred. She was found lying on her dining room floor about three o'clock in the afternoon unconscious and never regained consciousness. The body was brought to Reynoldsville on noon train Sunday and taken to Paradise Lutheran church, where funeral service was conducted by Rev. Selner. Interment was made in Syphrit cemetery.

Mrs. Klingensmith was born in Jefferson county in June, 1849, and would have been 57 years old next June. Her maiden name was Matilda Ludwick. She was married to John Flickinger in 1866 and resided in Reynoldsville a number of years. Mr. Flickinger died a number of years ago. On the 3rd day of September, 1902, Mrs. Flickinger was married at Luthersburg to H. K. Klingensmith, of Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Klingensmith is survived by six children to her first husband, Clarence, Samuel, George, Harry and Edward Flickinger and Mrs. James Sample, and one brother and two sisters, Lewis Ludwick and Mrs. Allen Cathers, of Paradise, and Mrs. Adaline Kamerer, of Pittsburgh.

Deceased had been a member of the Lutheran church about ten years. She was an excellent woman.
