

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Red Bank Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, the right to erect, maintain and operate a telephone line on and along certain streets and alleys of the borough of West Reynoldsville as hereinafter designated. Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the borough of West Reynoldsville, Jefferson County, Pennsylvania, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same.

Section 1. That the right of way be and the same is hereby granted to the Red Bank Telephone Company, its successors and assigns to erect and maintain lines of poles, mains, wires, along, in, under, over, through and across public streets, avenues, alleys, bridges, viaducts and ways in the borough, said public streets and alleys to be hereinafter designated for the purpose of operating a Telephone Exchange and telephone lines, provided said lines of poles shall be placed under the direction of the town council so as to interfere least with the public use of said streets, avenues and alleys as hereinafter stated. The Company to be responsible to the borough for all damages caused in erecting, maintaining and operating said lines.

Section 2. The poles shall be of sound timber and kept properly painted and not less in size than 15 inches in diameter, 6 feet from butt, wires not to be less than 30 feet elevation from ground, and when placed on street or streets, avenues or alleys as hereinafter designated are to be placed within or without the line of the curb and at such place as the council may direct, so as not to interfere with any sewerage, gas pipes or water lines now built or hereafter to be built.

Section 3. Hereafter the wires of all electric light, telegraph or telephone companies to be erected or standing at an angle across the wires of said Telephone Company shall not in this case or in any other be allowed to approach the wires of said Telephone Company more than two (2) feet nor said Telephone Company be allowed to place its wires nearer than two (2) feet to the wires of said other company. The provisions of this section are to apply with equal force to motor wires for street railway purposes except so far as they may interfere with the proper placing of the motor wires hereafter to be placed in which case it shall be the duty of the said Telephone Company to yield the right of way of said motor wires and change the placing of their lines accordingly.

In case of the violation of this section it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to notify the offending company to remove its wires, poles and fixtures so erected in violation herein within three days of such notification and in failure to comply with such notification, it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to remove the same at the expense of the offending party or company.

Section 4. That it is agreed by the said Company that in the consideration of the grant of the right of way as hereinafter provided that said Telephone Company will put up and provide a phone in the municipal building or elsewhere in the borough as the council may direct for the use of the borough officers, free of charge.

The use of the poles of the company by the borough for carrying electric fire alarm wires shall be permitted free of

expense and charge to the said borough. Section 5. Said company, its successors and assigns, are to remove within ten days after notice has been served by the council or street commissioner, in writing, all dead pole or poles not having living wires on them.

Section 6. The public streets, avenues, alleys, bridges, viaducts and ways for poles and lines shall be located in said borough as follows: Pike street, Brown street, Broad street and First Avenue. All of said poles are to be subject to a pole tax of — per pole, said tax to be paid to the borough treasurer annually on or before the first Monday of March of each and every year. Said poles and wires are not to be used in conjunction with the Red Bank Telephone Company by any other persons or company at the same time without the consent of the council of the borough of West Reynoldsville, by ordinance duly passed.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and acceptance by the Red Bank Telephone Company in behalf of itself, its successors and assigns, and its publication as provided by law, the costs and expenses of said publication to be paid by the said Red Bank Telephone Company, provided said company shall file with the clerk of council its written acceptance within ten days after the publication of said ordinance and paying for said publication at the time of such written acceptance, and provided further that its poles are erected on or before January 1, 1907; otherwise this ordinance becomes null and void of no effect.

Section 8. That the rights and privileges hereby granted shall be held and used subject to the terms and provisions of the laws and ordinances of the borough of West Reynoldsville, now in force or hereafter to be passed, regulating and relating to the same.

Section 9. That any ordinance or part of ordinance, conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same is hereby repealed, and so far as the same effects this ordinance.

Enacted and ordained by the town council of the borough of West Reynoldsville, Pennsylvania, at a regular meeting held at the council chamber on February 5th, 1906, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Whereas at a regularly assembled meeting of the stockholders of the Reynoldsville Trust Company, held at their banking rooms on West Main street, in the Borough of Reynoldsville, Jefferson County, Pennsylvania, on the eighth day of February, A. D., 1906, a resolution was unanimously adopted by the said stockholders that The Reynoldsville Trust Company surrender its charter to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and that the said Trust Company become an association for the carrying on the business of banking under the laws of the United States. Therefore, in compliance with the provisions of an Act of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, approved the 30th day of April, A. D., 1889, P. L. 66, notice is hereby given that the Directors of the said Reynoldsville Trust Company have procured the authority of the owners of two-thirds of the capital stock to make the certificate required therefore by the laws of the United States, and that it is the intention of the said Directors to accept the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Assembly and to convert the above named Trust Company into a National bank.

AN ARGUMENT THAT CANNOT BE ANSWERED



During the recent epidemic of Small-pox in Pennsylvania a family of four, a mother and three children were taken to the Municipal Hospital in Philadelphia, the mother seriously ill with Small-pox. As there was no one to take care of these children, and as they had all been exposed to the disease and were liable to spread the infection, it was absolutely necessary to take them with their mother to the hospital. Two of these children being old enough to attend school had, the year before, been vaccinated under the so-called "tyrannical" law requiring

teachers to forbid the admission to school of children who could not present a certificate of successful vaccination. The third child being younger, the mother, yielding to the persuasion of foolish neighbors, refused to have vaccinated. The result is shown in the illustration taken from a photograph. Contrast the beautiful, soft, healthy skins and placid faces of the two children on the outside, protected by vaccination, with the horrid condition of the little unvaccinated sufferer between them, evidently in torture from the loathsome eruption and scarcely able to see out of its swollen eyes. This poor

little victim of prejudice was infected by its mother and broke out with the disease soon after entering the hospital. The two others remained several weeks in the hospital and, although living all this time in an infected atmosphere, continued perfectly well. Is it possible that a mother lives so cruel that, after gazing upon this picture, she will be willing to deny her darling children the benefit of protection against this terrible infection?
