AN ODD SEA FOOD.

Virtues of the Gignatic Marine Snall Known as the Abalone.

Though the flesh of the abalone is a nutritious and wholesome article of food, highly esteemed by the Chinese and Japanese, few people in the United States know anything about the abalone except that it has a large shell with a bright, pearly interior. The abalone is a gigantic sea snall, whose nat ural home is the deep water off a rocky coast. The whole coast of central and lower California, from Cape Mende cino to Cape St. Lucas, abounds in abalones, the supply being absolutely unlimited. As fast as an area of fishing ground is depleted it is repeopled by full grown abalones coming in from the ocean. Three months after a piece of ground has been thoroughly cleared by the abalone fishers the supply is as abundant as ever. The contents of the large abalone shell weigh as much as two pounds.

Long ago the Chinese and Japanes discovered the value of the meat as a wholesome and digestible food. The supply of abalones in Chinese waters is, however, small, and the fishing grounds off the coast of Japan were s heavily drawn upon that they became exhausted. The people are forbidder by an imperial edict from taking them The Japanese and Chinese in Califor nia dive for the abalones, which craw about the rocks at the bottom of th sea in deep water outside the surf The divers bring them ashore an spread them out in a sunny place t dry. This process reduces the abalon to about one-third of its original bulk leaving a tough, horny product. The dried abalones are sent to the orient where they are soaked and stewed or ground into powder and used for mak

In the pure, deep water of the ocean the abalone lives, and as it is a clear feeder its flesh is always sound and wholesome, being superior in this re spect to that of oysters and clam which live near shore and are ofte contaminated by sewage and other in purities. The viscera of an abalon unlike those of the clam or oyste which must be swallowed whole, an quite separate from the muscular of edible part and can be detached by single stroke of a knife. - Chicas
