**DR. DRIVER'S HOME LIFE.**

His Wife an Invalid—Four Children; All Dead—Son Killed in Philippines—Baby Left at His Door.

In conversation with Dr. John Merritte Driver, who lectured in Assembly hall last Thursday evening, we learned some facts about his private life that will, no doubt, interest our readers, especially those who heard Dr. Driver lecture. His wife is an invalid. Four children were born unto them. They are all dead. Their last son, aged seventeen years, a soldier, was killed in the Philippines. One night the middle of January, 1905, at midnight, one of the coldest nights of the cold winter of 1905, in one of the coldest sections of Chicago—along the lake front—a baby boy two weeks old, with about \$1,000 worth of ointments, perfumery, fine clothing, &c., was left on his front porch by some unknown person or persons. The person that left the baby on the porch sounded the burglar alarm to awaken Dr. Driver and call him to his front porch. Dr. Driver lost \$25,000 several years ago and now he is working hard to regain that amount so that if he should die his invalid wife will not be left in poverty. Since the first of last September Dr. Driver has only missed five nights that he has not lectured and he preaches once every Sunday.

Recently in a lecture Dr. Driver spoke of the trashy literature that was flooding the country, increasing, as he said, "like the lies and toads in Pharaoh's time," and the next morning a gentleman handed him a four hundred and fifty page, paper back novel and said, "I thought I would buy you a book to read." On the front page was a colored picture, title of book in large, catchy type and the author's name in bold face type. The title was, "Modern Tragedy! Powerful Story of Love and Intrigue!" The most astonishing thing about it to Dr. Driver was the author's name, "John Merritte Driver." The other fellow had the joke on Dr. Driver. Early in life Dr. Driver had written the novel and had forgotten all about it. He had the novel in his satchel and showed us a scribe the copy.
